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


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

Annual Report 2022-23





SEMINAR REPORT:

This event, held in collaboration with the Bal Suraksha Abhiyan Trust (BSA), Kalimpong, marked the observance of the International Day for Child Rights & Protection. The initiative aimed to deepen understanding and foster awareness among students regarding the crucial issues surrounding children's rights and safeguarding measures. The programme underscored the college's commitment to nurturing informed citizens and advocates for child welfare within the community.



The session commenced with an introduction of Bal Suraksha Abhiyan (BSA), an NGO closely associated with Childline and headquartered in Kalimpong. Sister Clairette Lepcha- Program Officer of BSA- serving as the resource person began by delineating the fundamental principles of child rights and the legal frameworks that safeguard them. Her comprehensive overview extended to elucidating the operational procedures of the NGO, emphasizing how they handle cases and execute rescue missions.


